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Preface

Formation / Mission

Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority (HTUA) has been formed by the Hualapai Council in accordance with Hualapai rules, regulations and ordinances.

The five primary missions for the HTUA as defined by Section 107 of the Ordinance are as follows;

1) Establish and maintain electric power service for Grand Canyon West,

2) Establish and maintain water service for Grand Canyon West,

3) Establish and maintain sewage service for Grand Canyon West,

4) Establish and maintain telecommunications service,

5) Establish and maintain such additional utility services for such other locations within the Hualapai Reservation and on other Tribal lands under the jurisdiction of the Hualapai Tribe as the Tribal Council may deem appropriate pursuant to Section 108 of this Ordinance.

To accomplish these various missions, HTUA is authorized to carry out the following kinds of activities:

(1) To plan for, provide, and furnish electric power, water and wastewater utility services to GCW and provide telecommunication services for the Hualapai Reservation and other Tribal lands under the jurisdiction of the Hualapai Tribe. Such services may include other energy-related services, including energy conservation and the use of renewable energy technologies.

(2) To promote the use of HTUA's services where available in order to improve the health and welfare of residents of the Reservation and to facilitate economic development.

(3) To acquire, construct, operate, maintain, promote, and expand electric power service, water service, and wastewater service at GCW as well as acquire, construct, operate, maintain, promote, and expand telecommunications throughout the Hualapai Reservation and on such other locations within the Hualapai Reservation and on other Tribal lands under the jurisdiction of the Hualapai Tribe as the Tribal Council may deem appropriate pursuant to Section 108 of this Ordinance.

(4) To operate utility services so as to provide revenue sufficient to service debt on particular component projects as may be required by creditors on such component projects.

(5) To do everything necessary, proper, and advisable, or convenient for the accomplishment of the mission set forth in this section, and to do all things incidental to or connected with such mission, which are not forbidden by law, this Ordinance, or the Hualapai Constitution.

Annual Report Requirements

In accordance with Section 110 of the Hualapai Tribal Utility Authority (HTUA) Ordinance, the Board of Directors (Board) shall submit a report to the Tribal Council on an annual basis. The report shall include, but not be limited to;

- 1) financial conditions,
- 2) proposed budget for the upcoming fiscal year,
- 3) rates for various classes of consumers,
- 4) progress on HTUA's mission, and
- 5) other pertinent utility matters.

Any actions that the Board plans to take in the upcoming year that appear to require approval by the Tribal Council shall be highlighted in the annual report, including any request for the appropriation of Tribal funds for the operation of HTUA. The Board may assign the General Manager the responsibility for preparing the report, although it shall be presented to, and must be approved by, the Board before being submitted to the Tribal Council. Failure to seek Council approval in an annual report will not necessarily preclude the HTUA from taking a planned action, but, if Council approval is required, a supplemental report to the Council (followed by Council approval) shall be required.

Mr. Davis and Ms. Keller-Robinett were appointed to the HTUA Board by Tribal Council joining the Board in April 2019.

I. <u>Executive Summary</u>

During 2019, HTUA continued to address the mission(s) set forth by the tribal council at its formation as described in the preface above. HTUA made several presentations during 2019 to the Hualapai Council, obtaining direction and guidance from the Council on its efforts. HTUA's primary efforts continued to be directed towards the utility (electricity, water, wastewater, telecomm) requirements for Grand Canyon West (GCW) with a primary focus of the development of a Power line and a Solar Power Plant for GCW. Additionally HTUA, at Council direction, is overseeing the deployment and operation of a high speed wireless educational internet for Tribal homes in Peach Springs.

The development of the GCW Power line focused on satisfying environmental regulatory requirements. The proposed route traverses the Hualapai Reservation and on lands administered by the BLM. Over the course of 2019 HTUA has been able to submit a Biological Report, Cultural Report, Plan of Development, and Vegetative Management Plan to both the BLM and Hualapai Cultural and natural Resources Departments for their review and approval. The final draft Environmental Assessment document should be completed and submitted to the HTUA in January 2020 for review and approval prior to distribution for public comment. Preliminary economic models for operating and maintaining the power line after construction have also been completed. The HTUA plans to complete the final engineering of the Power Line as soon as the BLM grants the requested ROW. HTUA anticipates submitting to the Hualapai Council a complete; financial, engineering and construction plan for the Power Line plan for possible funding in the 2021 Hualapai budget.

HTUA also issued an RFP for a Solar Power Plant at GCW. The RFP requested bids for the engineering, procurement and construction of a Solar Power Plant that can provide for up to 50% of the electric energy requirements currently used by GCW. The HTUA Board met with all of the responders to the RFP to review the technical and economic merits of their responses to the RFP. HTUA is planning on requesting DOE matching grant funding for the Solar Power Plant through a grant application for the recently announced DOE funding opportunity. The grant application deadline is February 6, 2020.

The Hualapai council requested that HTUA oversee the installation and management of a free high speed internet service to households in Peach Springs with school age children. HTUA posted a public notice seeking voluntary participants in the pilot program. As a result of that posting, approximately 25

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households were identified as qualified participants in the pilot. . HTUA is planning on activating the service during the month of January 2020.

II. Mission Related Accomplishments 2019

1) New Board Members

HTUA welcomed two new Board members in 20919. Jason Davis and Lana Keller Robinett were appointed by the Hualapai Tribal Council and joined the Board in April 2019. Mr. Davis is serving as the Board Treasurer and Ms. Keller Robinett is serving as the Board's Secretary.

2) Power Line Related

The HTUA Board has been investigating the construction of a power line to GCW. The closest feasible point for connecting the new Power line is at the UniSource/TEP Dolan Springs Substation on Pierce Ferry Road in Dolan Springs.

a. Completed an interconnection study with Tucson Electric Power. The interconnection study examined the technical merits of interconnecting the proposed GCW power line to Tucson Electric Power system at the existing Dolan Springs substation located on the Pierce Ferry Road in Dolan Springs. The interconnection study showed that approximately 3 MW of power can be transmitted from the proposed Dolan Springs interconnection point to GCW. The 3 MW transfer capacity is approximately 3 to 5 times greater than the current power requirements at GCW today. The Tucson Electric Power system in this area is working close to maximum capacity. As the regional power demands continue to increase we can expect that Tucson Electric Power will upgrade their system and as a result we can also expect a greater transfer capacity than the 3MW currently identified.

The cost for the equipment to connect to the Dolan Springs substation is estimated to be approximately \$1.0 million. The final cost to interconnect will be determined by Tucson Electric Power through a System Facility Study by the end of the second quarter in 2020. The primary components for the interconnection are; substation metering, Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA), circuit breaker, isolation switch(s) and a multi-step capacitor bank.

- b. Completed and submitted Cultural and Biological report for the proposed ROW from Dolan Springs substation to GCW to the BLM and Hualapai Cultural for review and approval.
- c. Completed and submitted plan of development and vegetation management plan for the proposed power line from Dolan Springs to GCW to BLM and Hualapai Cultural for review and approval.

- d. HTUA met with the <u>Friends of the Joshua Tree Forest</u> to discuss the proposed Power Line routing. This organization was opposed routing the power line among the Joshua Trees along Diamond Bar Road. It was after our meeting with this organization that the BLM advised that the Diamond Bar route should be removed from further consideration.
- A series of public meetings were held to present the project specifics to the communities in the vicinity of the proposed power line route. Meetings were held in Dolan Springs, Meadview and Peach Springs. The meetings were lightly attended. Opposition to the proposed power line routing was again expressed by the <u>Friends of the Joshua Tree Forrest</u> at the Meadview meeting.
- f. An internal draft of the final environmental assessment document for the power line from Dolan Springs to GCW has been reviewed internally and it is planned to submit the final document to the BLM and Hualapai Cultural and Natural Resource Departments for review and approval in January 2020.
- g. The HTUA Board met with senior management of the Western Area Power Administration (WAPA) at its January 2019 Board meeting. As a result of that meeting, HTUA worked with Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), completed a technical power line interconnection options study. The primary purpose was to identify and then review the technical feasibility of all available interconnection options in the region. The study identified 4 possible interconnection points. Dolan Springs substation, Round Valley substation, Peacock substation and a yet to be developed White Hills substation to be constructed as part of the new wind farm. These identified interconnection locations will be further reviewed in the future as HTUA looks at serving potential future loads such as Peach Springs, GCW future development (hotel, golf course, etc....) and the expected water pumping loads with a future Colorado River water allocation.

HTUA views the development of the Dolan Springs interconnection and construction of the Dolan Springs to GCW power line as a first step and the power line will continue to be used in the future to serve load and enhance overall HTUA electric grid system reliability. It is envisioned that in the future a power line system loop will be established from Dolan Springs to GCW then down the Buck and Doe road out to Peach Springs continuing to Round Valley or Peacock substations. HTUA is planning to continue working with WAPA in developing the HTUA power delivery system.

 An economic model has been developed for the feasibility of HTUA constructing and operating the power line. The economic evaluation reviews the costs of constructing the line and continuing operating expenses such as purchase power, maintenance and labor. The economic model also quantifies the savings to GCW and the Hualapai Tribe from the reduction (total elimination except for emergencies) of generator diesel fuel expenses at GCW.

3) GCW Solar Project

The HTUA Board has also been investigating the construction of a solar power system for GCW to supplement to the new power line from the Dolan Springs Substation.

- a) HTUA issued an RFP for the construction of a solar power plant at GCW. The solar power plant as currently envisioned will; provide 50% of the current electrical requirements of GCW, be integrated into the GCW micro grid, be expandable, and provide for energy storage batteries.
- b) HTUA Board conducted a special Board meeting to review all of the submitted proposals. At this meeting the Board discussed the technical and economic merits of the proposals.
- c) The work completed by HTUA on the solar power plant this year will allow for the submission of an application for the Department of Energy grant to support the construction of the solar power plant.

4.) Telecommunication

The Hualapai tribal Council requested that HTUA oversee the installation and management of a pilot program that will result in the offering of free high speed internet service to households in Peach Springs with school age children. This offering is being coordinated by MuralNet who is affiliated with Northern Arizona University. HTUA posted a public notice seeking voluntary participants in the pilot program. As a result of that posting, approximately 25 households were identified as qualified participants in the pilot.

HTUA has worked with MuralNet on obtaining the necessary wireless frequency from the FCC. HTUA has also has assisted with the installation of the necessary equipment at the Honaga Hill tower site that will broadcast the wireless service to the participating homes. Most of the equipment had been received and/or installed by year's end. HTUA is planning on activating the service during the month of January.

The council also requested HTUA to participate in the AT&T Fiber Optic ROW grant renewal request. AT&T has an existing ROW grant on the Hualapai reservation where it has placed a fiber optic cable into the ground. This ROW grant expired 5 years ago and AT&T is now seeking

a renewal of that Grant. HTUA continues to review applicable documents and negotiations providing comments and suggestions for the negotiations.

III. FY 2019 Financial Report

HTUA's operational budget for 2019 as approved by the Hualapai Council was \$250,000. As of December 31, 2019, HTUA had expended \$215,332.32 leaving an unexpended amount of \$34,667.68.

V. Mission Goals for 2020

- 1) GCW Power Line
 - a. Finalize Dolan Springs to GCW power line Environmental Assessment documents with the BLM and obtain the requested power line ROW.
 - b. Complete Facility Study with Tucson Electric Power for interconnection at Dolan Springs substation.
 - c. Prepare power line engineering RFP and assist in completing the final power line design
 - d. Once the final power line design is received, solicit bid on material costs and labor for constructing the power line.
 - e. Develop economic models for the final build-out including multiyear deployment/construction/development strategies.
 - f. Finalize economic model for HTUA operation, and maintenance of the power line after it is constructed
 - g. Prepare a budget and construction plan for consideration by the Hualapai Council for inclusion in the 2021 budget
- 2) GCW Solar
 - a. Complete the Grant application
 - b. Finalize design to comply with grant funding levels.
 - c. Provide project management and construction of the solar power plant at GCW and interconnect to the micro grid including project siting through the NEPA review process.
 - d. Finalize operation and maintenance plans for the new solar power plant.
- 3) Western Area Power Administration (WAPA)
 - a. Provide for a joint meeting with WAPA, HTUA and Tribal Council
 - b. Work with WAPA to optimize and power line interconnection(s)
 - c. Work with WAPA to identify wholesale market power for purchase and use at GCW after the new power line is constructed and operational
- 4) Mohave Electric (MEC)
 - a. Meet with Mohave Electric Cooperative to determine how to improve reliability to Peach Springs.
 - b. Ascertain the sale price of the MEC electrical assets in Peach Springs for the possibility of HTUA taking over ownership and operational responsibilities

- c. Develop agreements with MEC for delivering power to Peach Springs after/if HTUA obtains ownership of Peach Springs electrical assets.
- 5) Telecommunications Related
 - a. Continue to manage and operate Peach Springs high-speed wireless educational network.
 - b. Continue to advise negotiating committee and Hualapai Council on the AT&T fiber optic ROW grant renewal.

- Review and Approve Minutes from December 20, 2018 –
 The minutes were approved as written 3 0 on a motion by Mr. Vaughn and second by Mr. Montana
- 4. Final 2019 HTUA Budget as approved by Tribal Council <u>Mr. Cyr and Mr. Davidson discussed the final 2019</u> <u>HTUA Budget as approved by Tribal Council. The budget as approved is approximately \$251,000.</u> <u>Approximately, \$206,000 is already committed to professional services contracts with Mr. Cyr (\$90,000)</u> <u>and Tierra Right of Way (\$121,000). This leaves a balance of approximately \$40,000 for other items.</u>



- 5. Proposed Power Line to Grand Canyon West
 - a. Status of BLM work <u>The Federal Government shutdown has impacted BLM</u> work. It appears BLM offices were closed after December 21, 2018. We expect no additional work in this area until the government shutdown is resolved.
 - b. Status of power line survey <u>No additional survey work has been completed and no additional</u> <u>survey work is scheduled.</u>
 - c. Status of NEPA/ Environmental
 - Brief on Tierra Right-of-Way work in December 2018 <u>Mr. Davidson notified the Board</u> <u>that the Hualapai Council had extended the Tierra Right of Way contract for an additional</u> <u>12 months at a sum of \$121,600. The Board was also provided with a summary of Tierra</u> <u>Right of Ways progress to date.</u>
 - d. Status Pierce Ferry/Diamond Bar
 - i. BIA Encroachment Permit <u>Mr. Cyr and Mr. Davidson provided the Board with a copy of</u> <u>BIA Encroachment Permit Application. This permit application will be completed at the</u> <u>appropriate time. The appropriate time is loosely defined as final route selection,</u> <u>environmental preliminary results and additional clarification on ownership/maintenance</u> <u>of the Diamond Bar Road.</u>
 - ii. Friends of the Arizona Joshua Tree Forest letter <u>The Board was presented with a draft</u> <u>letter to send to The Friends of the Arizona Joshua Tree Forest (FAJTF). In summary, the</u> <u>letter is requesting for a face to face, joint meeting between HTUA and FAJTF. After some</u> <u>discussion, Mr. Vaughn signed the letter and the Board approved the transmittal of said</u> <u>letter.</u>
 - e. Status Tucson Electric Power System Impact Study Dolan Springs to Grand Canyon West
 - Potential Interconnection Study funding source <u>The Board reviewed a potential</u> <u>interconnection study funding source from The Office of Indian Energy and Economic</u> <u>Development.</u>
 - f. Status Final Transmission Line/Substation Design <u>The Board was informed that no additional</u> <u>design work has occurred.</u>
 - g. Financing The Board was informed that no additional work was performed in this area.



- Water/Wastewater/Electric/Telecommunication services to all parts of Hualapai Reservation - HTUA Strategic Plan
 - Path forward for HTUA electrical ---Base Model Strawman <u>The Board was presented with a Base</u> <u>Model Strawman detailing the expense revenues for HTUA electric service to Peach Springs and</u> Grand Canyon West. The model identified the following items:
 - Expected Revenues from Grand Canyon West and Peach Springs electric service
 - <u>The expenses for:</u>
 - o <u>Labor</u>
 - o <u>Cost of power</u>
 - o <u>Transmission</u>
 - o <u>Wheeling</u>
 - Debt service. Debt service was defined as:
 - Power line \$12.1M
 - <u>2MW Solar \$2.2M</u>
 - <u>Cost to purchase MEC assets in Peach Springs \$1M</u>
 - Startup cost \$1.5M

The model relies heavily on a redirection of the current fuel costs and some of the operating costs associated with the diesel generation located at Grand Canyon West. The model includes a \$2M redirection of those diesel costs to the HTUA. With the redirection of said \$2M the model has a net positive yearly cashflow of \$115,000. It was further relayed to the Board that this is a very preliminary estimate on this model and the numbers are expected to change as we obtain greater clarity on the overall project.

Mr. Vaughn relayed to staff and all Board members that at the time the diesel generation was installed at Grand Canyon West that the EPA qualified the installation with environmental requirements, specifically GCW is located in a Class 1 Air Shed. Mr. Vaughn indicated that we should become familiar with said regulations to ensure GCW remains in compliance.

 - a. Hoover operating committee 2019 meetings <u>The Board was informed of</u> <u>a recent Hoover operating committee meeting.</u>
 - b. WAPA Presentation <u>At this point in the board meeting WAPA provided the Board with various</u> presentations from three primary areas:
 - <u>CRSP Management Center</u>
 - Department of Energy Office of Indian Energy (Power Point presentation)
 - <u>Overview of Interconnection Process (Power Point presentation)</u>

During and after WAPAs formal presentation, HTUA was able to update WAPA on its efforts to date on bringing power to Grand Canyon West. WAPA suggested strongly that HTUA immediately apply for technical assistance grant with the Office of Indian Energy to fund a broad interconnection study to be conducted by WAPA that would look at:

- <u>Alternative Routes</u>
 - o <u>From Round Valley</u>
 - o <u>From Peacock</u>
 - From unknown or undefined locales as determined by WAPAs study
- Capability of 69kv system through Dolan Springs to supply 10MW or more at GCW
- <u>Benefits to adjacent utilities of a looped system through the Hualapai Reservation</u> <u>essentially looping UniSource and Mohave Electric.</u>

Mr. Cyr and Mr. Davidson will work with WAPA and the Office of Indian Energy to initiate the study as soon as possible. Mr. Davidson volunteered to create a new geographically based map that identifies all the alternative routes mentioned above including the alternative routes from UniSource's Dolan Springs substation already under consideration.



- 8. Other Matters
 - a. Update on Tribal Council actions Kevin
 - AT&T fiber optic easement and status of awarded contract update <u>Mr. Davidson indicated that</u> <u>the kick off meeting for the AT&T Fiber Optic negotiations should occur next week.  - (a) Path forward for HTUA electrical Base Model Strawman <u>Mr. Cyr provided an update to</u> <u>the board on the base model strawman for HTUA electric service to GCW and Peach Springs.</u> <u>Key takeaways are as follows:</u>
 - 1. <u>The model indicates that the project would be cash positive to the Hualapai</u> <u>bottom line for both 5%, 30-year financing or self-financing by the Hualapai</u> <u>Tribe.</u>
 - 2. <u>New information from GCW shows a minimum yearly expenditure of \$2.3M up</u> to \$3M for operation of the current diesels located at GCW. With a power line these costs could be reduce to approximately \$200,000 per year.
 - 3. <u>With the addition of a power line to GCW a 2 3 MW solar plant could be</u> <u>constructed with any excess sales flowing back into the transmission grid</u> <u>through Dolan Springs.</u>

Chairman Vaughn indicated that recent discussions regarding the proposed Hualapai Colorado River water allocation focused on reducing the total costs for delivery of said allocation to the Hualapai. Based on reducing costs the option for directional bore from the rim of the Grand Canyon at GCW, down to the Colorado River may be the most costeffective solution. Mr. Vaughn then requested Mr. Cyr work on determining the amount of power and the size of motors that would be required to pump the water from the bottom of the Grand Canyon up to GCW.¹

5. Proposed Power Line to Grand Canyon West

(a) **Environmental**<u>The board reviewed a written summary by Mr. Davidson, included in Board</u> package, of the recent meeting with the Friends of the Arizona Joshua Tree Forest recently held in Kingman Arizona. The bottom line is that the Friends of the Arizona Joshua tree Forest are not supportive of a power line that would be constructed in the Diamond Bar Road right of way.

Mr. Davidson then updated the Board regarding a recent conversation with Andy Whitefield of the BLM Kingman office. Mr. Whitefield is now indicating that the construction of the transmission line along the row of the Diamond Bar Route may not be in compliance with the BLM's Resource Management Plan (RMP). He will be getting back to Mr. Davidson in the next few days to discuss removing the Diamond Bar Road route as a primary alternative.

Mr. Davidson also briefed the Board on recent work completed by Tierra Right of Way. We can expect completed cultural and biological assessment reports in the next few weeks. Additionally, Mr. Davidson updated the Board on work related to a public outreach meeting to the communities of Dolan Springs, Meadview and Peach Springs. The Board recommends that the first meeting should occur in Peach Springs and then the other two locations thereafter. The Board further indicated that the public meetings do not occur until the Hualapai Council is briefed on the project status. The Council briefing should occur in early May and the public meetings can be scheduled after with Council concurrence. Mr. Davidson reminded the Board that the \$1.9 million grant is in jeopardy if we do not conclude environmental work by this fall.

Finally, Mr. Davidson provided a map showing the location of 3 new cultural site findings that occurred while trying to make minor adjustments to route alignment to avoid 3 other cultural sites and a stand of junipers. All of the cultural and biological reports will be available in the pending reports from Tierra and as such will be available for public comment during the public outreach phase of the project.



(b) Status of Final Transmission/Substation Design The Board was provided with detailed Line, Substation, and GCW site construction costs. Mr. Cyr compared the construction estimate provided by IMEG several years ago to recent cost estimates recently received on the most costly components of the project including but not limited to poles, conductors, hardware, and substation transformers. Mr. Cyr reported that the 12.6 million dollar estimate by IMEG is still valid today and can be used for developing economic models. A more detailed cost will be required after final route selection is made.

- 6. Water/Wastewater/Electric/Telecommunication services to all parts of Hualapai Reservation HTUA Strategic Plan
 - (a) Power Point Presentation for Hualapai Council

Mr. Cyr then went over a proposed Power Point presentation to the Hualapai Council on the status of HTUA's efforts in developing HTUA with a specific emphasis on the GCW power line. The Board made numerous suggestions on corrections and additions to the presentation. The Board recommended that Mr. Cyr make the corrections and then schedule a meeting with Wanda Easter to go over the presentation in detail with a primary focus on the financing and economics of the proposed project.

Mr. Cyr indicated that the economics are such that the transmission line can be constructed and financed if most of the dollars presently allocated to the operation of diesel generators at GCW was re-allocated to HTUA to pay for the transmission line debt and support continuing HTUA operational costs. In this scenario Mr. Cyr is estimating a net saving back to the Hualapai Tribe of approximately \$300,000 per year.

Mr. Cyr also informed the Board that according to preliminary results from UNES interconnection study, the addition of the pumping load associated with the anticipated

<u>Colorado River water allocation could not be technically supported by the</u> <u>proposed GCW power line from</u>

Dolan Springs. Mr. Cyr indicated that additional electrical infrastructure will be required to support the pumping load and as such should be included in the project estimate associated with the pumping of said Colorado River water. It is Mr. Cyr's opinion that the construction of the proposed GCW power line today would place HTUA in a position to manage and operate the required electrical infrastructure for the future pumping load. The construction of the GCW power line will establish HTUA as a "brick and mortar" operation and provides the HTUA organization with operational experience that can be leveraged to manage the construction and then the necessary pumping load infrastructure.

It would be advantageous for the Hualapai Tribe's utility to manage the pumping load infrastructure project from both an economic and operational point of view. From an economic point of view HTUA can leverage any construction dollars to HTUA's best interest. It is important to realize that the necessary infrastructure will be built and it will be much better to keep said money in the HTUA economy and not send it off the reservation to other utilities. Secondly, if HTUA builds out the necessary infrastructure, it can leverage the knowledge gained to continue to operate the facilities after they are built. It is important to note that third-party contractors and consultants will be required to assist in a project of the pumping load scale; however, the project should be financially directed by as many of the Hualapai's entities as possible.



- 7. Federal Hydro Power/WAPA/Other Power related

Mr. Cyr updated the Board on the status of the WAPA interconnection study. A one line diagram was presented to the Board depicting the power line routes that would be studied. WAPA indicated that the study is scheduled for completion in June 2019.

e. NextEra Proposals

i. White Hills Wind Farm

The Board was briefed by Mr. Davidson regarding s presentation by NextEra regarding the White Hills Wind Project scheduled to be given to the Hualapai Tribal Council on April 30.



ii. Grand Canyon West Solar Array

Mr. Cyr and Mr. Davidson briefed the Board regarding recent interaction with NextEra and their desire to provide a solar option presentation for GCW electrical power requirements. NextEra sent out an email indicating that they had been requested by tribal council members to present a solar project proposal for GCW.

<u>The author of the email was contacted and an initial phone conversation was</u> <u>followed up by a more detailed call with Kevin Davidson, Mr. Cyr and about 4 or 5</u> <u>representatives of NextEra. The bottom line of that follow up call is that NextEra</u> <u>does not have an actual proposal for presentation to the Hualapai Council at this</u> <u>time. They could not answer any technical questions regarding the operation,</u> <u>output or any other specifics of the proposal. Additionally, and perhaps most</u> <u>importantly, they indicated that they had not installed any solar solution of the</u> <u>magnitude required for GCW that operated off the grid. Mr. Davidson asked</u> <u>NextEra if a ball park estimate for such a project would be in the 8 to 12 million</u> <u>dollar range, to which they indicated that \$8-\$12 million is a representative estimate</u> <u>at this time.</u>

NextEra requested load data from HTUA to support the development of a proposal. The Board indicated that NextEra should be directed to the GCRC organization for the load data for the GWC operation.

NextEra also indicated that they will visit GCW during the period when they will be in town making a presentation to the council and public regarding the White Hills wind project discussed above(April 30—May 1). They indicated that they were available to meet and discuss the solar option; however, the Board felt it would be more appropriate to obtain further direction from the Hualapai council prior to doing so.

7. HTUA Economic Model



i. Updated Power Point for Hualapai Council

At the April 3, 2019, meeting, the Board directed Mr. Davidson and Mr. Cyr to present the underlying economic model for the GCW power line to the Tribe's finance director, Wanda Easter. The economic model along with the proposed Council power point was presented and reviewed by Ms. Easter on April 18th, 2019. Ms. Easter quickly understood the underlying proposal and made some interesting suggestions. Specifically,

- <u>self-financing should be considered for interest savings and may allow for</u> <u>quicker project approval in light of hurdles presented by the Hualapai</u> <u>Constitution.</u>
- <u>A rate should be developed that would be assessed to GCRC for power purchases</u> <u>from HTUA. That rate should cover all the costs HTUA requires to serve its first</u> <u>customer - GCRC's operations at GCW.</u>
- <u>Other projects are under consideration for self-financing and as such should be</u> <u>considered as competing projects for funding</u>

<u>Mr. Cyr provided the Board with a verbal brief on the presentation before the council on May 4,</u> 2019. Additional details are included in the May General Manager's report. The bottom line result of the presentation was that the Hualapai Council gave HTUA the green light to continue with its development efforts associated with the proposed power line to Grand Canyon West including public meetings in Peach Springs, Dolan Springs and Meadview.

The Hualapai Council tabled the approval of the HTUA Annual Report until the next Council meeting in order to allow Council members more time to review. The Hualapai Council approved the HTUA Annual Report at their meeting on May 6, 2019.

7. Dual Track Discussion Solar//Power Line

The Board then had a general discussion regarding the merits of pursuing a more detailed Solar Power Plant proposal for the renewable energy option. Some of the specific areas discussed included

Solar Option for GCW Power Supply

<u>Mr. Cyr discussed how it appears that the solar option for suppling today's energy</u> requirements for GCW may be less costly, on an initial and continuing operation basis cost basis, than the power line option. Mr. Cyr pointed out that the power line would allow for addition growth at GCW (about 3 times) over GCW current electrical energy requirements but he also indicted that the power line as designed today will not be able to support significant additional load such as the energy requirements for pumping water out of the Colorado River up to the Grand Canyon rim at GCW. The Board then had a general discussion of the solar option vs. the power line option. Three of th Board members felt that the power line otion was still the best option for moving forward citing Council directive to develop a power ine for GCW, power lines abilty to serve some additional economic development and better reliability with the power line and that a significant amount of time and money have been spent on legal and technical resources in the actualization of the hard line project.

<u>The board requested that Mr. Cyr prepare a cost comparison between the solar and</u> <u>power line options along with the pros and cons for both. The board requested that</u> <u>this analysis be completed for the August board meeting.</u>

The Board then had a general discussion of the solar option vs. the power line option.

Environmental Assessment for GCW Power Line



The Board was briefed by Mr. Cyr and Mr. Davidson on the status of the environmental work related to GCW. Mr. Cyr indicated that it appeared that the BLM was introducing unnecessary delays into the project by not quickly processing the ROW application or providing timely responses to work submitted by HTUA environmental consultants Tierra Right of Way. Mr. Cyr also indicated that he felt that the BLM was not honoring the special government-to-government relationship that is supposed to exist between recognized Native American tribes and the Federal Government. The board had a general discussion resulting in a request to draft a letter for Hualapai Tribal Council Charmin to the immediate supervisors of the BLM Kingman office. The letter will discuss concerns regarding project delays and the Government to Government relationship that should be afforded to the Hualapai Tribe as it pertains to the grant of a ROW for the power line.

WPA Interconnection Study Results

Mr. Cyr and Mr. Davidson reported on the results of the interconnection study performed by WAPA. The bottom line result is that to provide significant amounts of power to GCW, the WAPA 500 kv or WAPA 345 KV system will need to be tapped into. WAPA suggested that a potential interconnection point could be established if the White Hills wind generation project moves forward. If the project does move forward, the Hualapai Tribe may be able to leverage its status as a Native American Tribe to motivate the developer to pay for the interconnection equipment at no cost to the tribe. Construction of a new transmission line from GCW back to White Hills represents an additional cost to this option.

WAPA also indicated that it would go back and redo the interconnection study recently complete by UES—power line from Dolan Springs to GCW.

6. Budget

a. 2019 to Date

The Board was updated on HTUA expenditures to date--- approximately \$127,000 out of a budget of \$250,000

b. 2020 Direction

<u>The Board discussed on how best to address the 2020 Budget submission.</u> Either option for a GCW power line or a solar option will require a budget amount of between \$7 and \$15 million. Additionally the Chair and other long standing Board members offered the following clarifications to newer Board members

- <u>The past and current work related to bringing a hard wired power line to GCW was at the</u> <u>direction of the 2014 Hualapai Council and has been supported by subsequent Councils over the</u> <u>last 5 years through specific budget funding every year since then. Some of the funding was</u> <u>directed to preliminary engineering work, legal review, ROW surveying, cultural surveys,</u> <u>biological surveys, BLM funding and third-party study work by Unisource electric. Additionally,</u> <u>the council approved the hiring of a part time General Manager to support the development of</u> <u>the power line and the eventual operation of the "bricks and mortar" utility.</u>
- The power line should be considered as the primary and only option currently under consideration by the Hualapai Council.
- <u>The work related to determining the feasibility of a solar power plant at GCW is looking forward</u> to what can be done after the power line is constructed
- <u>The power line should still be considered as the most flexible (expandable) and reliable option for</u> power supply at GCW as supported through the years of work and research conducted by HTUA
- <u>The establishment of an operating electric utility today will be supportive of future electrical</u> <u>demands on the Hualapai reservation in the future. Without an operating utility the expansion</u> <u>of all utilities on the Hualapai Reservation will most likely continue to be provided by other non-</u> <u>Hualapai entities such as Mohave Electric, Unisource, Frontier and Verizon.</u>

The best example of future utility requirements is related to a potential Colorado River water allocation. With an operating utility, the Hualapai Tribe will be able to self-direct and manage the necessary construction of assets and take ownership of the assets; without an operating utility, it will be difficult to convince third-party lenders and grant providers that the Hualapai can self-direct the construction of these assets. Without that in house expertise, the assets will be constructed by third-party —non Hualapai companies that will retain ownership and continue to remove Tribal cash as it asserts tariffs for investor profits, salaries of non-tribal employees, the continued operation and maintenance of these assets.

Item 3 Review of August 28th tabled agenda items

a. RFP Summary Sheet/Bid Ranking

Mr. Cyr summarized the bid ranking summary sheets. Mr. Cyr explained that the first sheet summarized key facts such as the size and cost of the solar array, battery storage system and misc. items. Mr. Cyr pointed out that three of the bidders (Solon, Stockbridge, and Indian Energy) had proposed solar arrays and battery storage systems that were essentially the same size. The similarities of the three proposals were indicative that these three bidders have carefully reviewed the load data history provided allowing them to reach similar designs conclusions. These similarities should allow the board to focus on proposed costs and capabilities with some comfort that the proposed systems are designed for the requirements of GCW.

Bid ranking sheets of NREL, Mr. Montana and Mr. Cyr were included in Board package for review. All three ranked Indian Energy as the number one contender (Note: one ranking sheet had Indian Energy tied with Arizona Energy Partners.)

<u>Mr. Cyr noted that Mr. Davidson had reached out to NREL for technical assistance in reviewing bids</u> <u>and that this technical help was very helpful and answered some of the key technical questions at</u> <u>hand.</u>

Item 3 Review of August 28th tabled agenda items

b. Solar / Power Line comparison

Mr. Cyr went over a technical presentation that compared the solar option to the power line option. The presentation started with a review of various graphs showing average monthly energy consumption and energy demand at GCW. It was explained that bidders would use this information to size the proposed solar field. In addition, these same graphs could be used to help compare the solar option to the power line option. It was pointed out that both systems could meet the current



power requirements at GCW but the power line could supply much more energy than the solar field without any additional capital cost whereas additional energy from a solar array would require additional capital expenditures beyond what is proposed in the RFP.

Key comparison factors were also discussed such as initial cost, visual appeal, environmental aspects, reliability, fire hazard, ability to serve future loads, power supply cost stability and the fact that the power line could be used to bring a high-speed fiber optic line to GCW.

The above bidders provided visual and oral presentations to the Board. Mr. Davidson provided all Board members with a proposed list of questions for bidders. Drawing from Mr. Davidsons list all bidders were asked similar questions from the Board in the following areas

- How to improve upon or hide visual impact
- The ability of the system to be expanded to serve addition load at GCW
- <u>Tilt or fixed</u>
- Solar experience
- <u>Ability to maintain frequency</u>
- Maintenance requirements
- Expandability
- Ability to pump water from Colorado River at GCW
- Overall experience and experience with off-grid systems



- Training of Hualapai staff to maintain
- Ability to work according to grant funding rules
- Integrating software
- How they arrived at system size

Key take away from these presentations were as follows:

- <u>Three of the presenters had excellent presentation and appeared to have the necessary</u> <u>experience and staff to complete the project—Indian Energy, AGM and Solon. Stockbridge</u> <u>appeared to have the capabilities to complete project but did not present a very strong</u> <u>technical team. Arizona Energy partners had little to no experience in the scale required at</u> <u>GCW and the primary architect of the proposal was not in attendance</u>
- <u>The proposed systems for the most part would provide approximately 80 % of the energy</u> <u>requirements for GCW. The reminder of energy requirements would need to come from the</u> <u>existing diesels. Achieving a 95 % energy penetration would require additional capital</u> <u>expenditures of 40-50% more than currently proposed.</u>
- <u>The solar system, if size appropriately, could handle the pumping requirements and</u> <u>additional load; however, significant additional capital expenditures into additional solar</u> <u>arrays and batteries would be required.</u>
- From an aesthetic point-of-view, beauty is in the eye of the beholder. Mitigation of the visual impact will add costs. Significant costs will occur as the solar field is placed further from existing mini-grid. Some solar power plant owners chose to showcase the solar plant to the public emphasizing the nature of the green energy produced.
- <u>The proposed solar plants could be expanded relatively easily to accommodate future loads</u> <u>however significant capital costs will be required to accommodate any significant load</u> <u>growth.</u>



- All but Solon thought fixed solar was the appropriate design instead of a tracking array
- <u>The solar system will be most efficient in the winter months which are co-incident with the</u> peak loads at GCW.
- <u>All indicated that local tribal staff could be trained to operate and maintain the system with</u>
 <u>occasional third-party help for any major technical issues</u>
- The system will have a 25 year life and will require several battery change outs.
- Solar output from the array at the end of 25 years should be around 80% of the initial energy output capabilities.

Mr. Davidson and Mr. Cyr met with Jack Linley for a field visit of the power line right of way in the Tenney Ranch/Hells Canyon area. Mr. Linley is an experienced line worker with over 30 years of constructing 69 KV power lines in and around the Southwest Desert. The take always from this meeting were as follows

- There should be no problem with construction of the line within the proposed ROW
- The project can be easily completed in a multiyear stage in approach
- The multiyear staged in approach lends its self to
 - *constructing the line with Hualapai employees thus lowering the overall cost for construction*
 - One to three experienced line workers along with 4 or 5 hardworking Hualapai members (who would be trained by experienced line workers - on the job training) could construct the line over a three year period or quicker depending on the availability of budget



dollars. At the end of the construction period staff would be reduced to match operation and maintenance workload.

- <u>The 90 foot single metal poles proposed for the Hells Canyon area could be replaced with</u> <u>55-60 foot 3 pole structures that could be installed and maintained without helicopters</u> <u>thus reducing initial costs and continuing maintenance costs.</u>

 - <u>MuralNet is looking to move forward and a letter has been generated seeking participants.</u> To <u>be discussed with Board at Board meeting.</u>
- > Hualapai Council / HTUA Joint Meeting Presentation
 - <u>Board member Joe Montana</u>, <u>Mr. Davidson and Mr. Cyr met with the Hualapai Council</u> <u>immediately after the September HTUA Board Meeting.</u>
 - <u>The meeting request letter, meeting agenda and meeting material are included in this Board</u> <u>package -Section Item Number 6 "Summary of Meeting with Hualapai Council on September 26,</u> <u>2019".</u>
 - After the presentation and subsequent discussions the Council directed HTUA to prepare the 2020 budget proposal in the following manner;
 - Provide a budget that allows the Hualapai Tribe to move forward on both fronts
 - <u>Reduce the size of the Solar project so that it supplies 50% of the GCW energy</u> <u>requirements</u>
 - Provide a budget proposal for the power line that
 - Allows for obtaining ROW from BLM-complete environmental assessment work
 - Preserves the \$1.9 million grant
 - <u>Provides for completing the engineering of the power line</u>
 - <u>Development of an implementation plan that allows for the construction of the</u> power line over a 3 or 4 year period.

<u>2020 Budget</u>

- Budget has been revised to reflect direction received from Council during September 25, 2019 HTUA/Hualapai Council joint meeting.

b) November 2019

The General Manager reviewed the following report with the Board

Solar Option for GCW Power Supply

No significant progress on this item in October or November; however, I did attend a webinar on battery safety. The battery seminar was very informative and discussed the fire that occurred in Phoenix earlier this year, in summary here are the primary take always from this seminar

- Primary problem is called "Thermal Run Away"
- Thermal Runaway occurs most often in a valve regulated acid (VRLA) battery when the rate of internal heat generation exceeds the rate at which the heat can be expelled. ... If your VRLA battery experiences thermal runaway, the heat it generates will destroy it. The battery can eventually hit temperatures of more than 1,000° F. At that point the flammable electrolyte can ignite or even explode when exposed to the oxygen in the air.
- Thermal runaway happens usually during charging. The temperature quickly rises to the melting point of the metallic lithium and causes a violent reaction. ... During a thermal runaway, the high heat of the failing cell can propagate to the next cell, causing it to become thermally unstable as well
- Battery manufacturers are working on different systems to prevent this occurrence
- <u>Battery manufacturers are also working on ways to detect the start of thermal runaway and then</u> <u>take measures to mitigate the situation causing the thermal runaway condition.</u>
- <u>The best example out there is the exploding cell phone batteries a few years ago. --- If you remember</u> <u>they were banned from airplanes.</u>
- <u>The actual fires seam to occur due to the high buildup of pressures in the battery buildings or</u> <u>trailers</u>. The pressures get so high that the building itself explodes and it is that explosion that <u>causes the fires</u>.
- If we obtain a system with battery storage we will have to review very closely that battery manufacturers system very carefully. Some are building trailers that will fail in strategic points so as not to cause a complete catastrophic explosion.
- Environmental Assessment for Power Line to Grand Canyon West
 Work in this area continues with a primary focus this month on a vegetative management plan.
 The vegetative management plan is included for Board review in the Board package
- High Speed Wireless Internet Deployment –Peach Spring



- Over the last month there were several conference calls/meetings with MuralNert, Hualapai IT, and a meeting with the Tribal Chair.
- o IT department will assist with getting antenna installed
 - Permit has been obtained
- <u>HTUA will need to manage day to day</u>
 - <u>Bill Cyr to perform this function initially</u>
 - <u>Customer database</u>
- Cost for the back haul bandwidth at \$1,395 a month for 50 MB
 - Planning Department will pay for the month of December however an additional \$16,470 will need to be budgeted for 2020 (Planning, HTUA, IT?)
- HTUA is working on obtaining frequency spectrum from FCC
- We have obtained detailed equipment specifications
 - <u>Customer devices will not be the ones presented to the Board last month</u>
 - Only one device will be required that combines both antenna and router
 - Device does not need to be placed in window unless signal strength is weak
- MuralNet will assist with actual install
 - They have provided propagation map
 - Antenna will be 120 or 90 or 60 degrees
 - Approximate 4 mile propagation range
 - Our service area is about 1.5 miles
- o Overall backhaul bandwidth may become an issue—may limit initial deployment to 25 homes

WECOM to Provide Additional Bandwidth to Peach Springs

In a related item to MuralNet, we learned that the IT Department/Tribe is moving forward with bringing in a fiber(s) optic line from Kingman that will improve the bandwidth available in Peach Springs. The Tribe sent a letter of support to a project by WECOM to bring a fiber optic line to Peach Springs sometime next year. WECOM obtained a grant of \$1.8 million from the USDA. The grant has a match requirement of 25%, so the total project cost is approximately 2.4 million. They will be providing 10 Giga-bytes total with 100 MB to each home. WECOM intends to run a fiber to each home/business on Mohave Electric existing poles. As of yet they have not provided a projected cost for the service.

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Kevin and I met with the Tribal chair and Mikel Allen and Ben Roberts of the IT Department. The intent of the meeting was to obtain a better understanding of the project. In the end all parties agreed that any service provided by WECOM should not be exclusive or handcuff the Hualapai Tribe from offering an alternative service.

This project should be considered as the negotiations regarding the ATT fiber ROW lease move forward. If the Tribe wishes to continue developing its independence/sovereignty it must proceed with cation with third-party communications suppliers if it does not want to have an outside entity create a monopoly on this service similar to the one Mohave Electric has in Peach Springs today.

HTUA has registered for the necessary bandwidth.

The acquisition of that FCC temporary license is on track for a December 9 in service/issuance date. The FCC license will be good for 30 days. HTUA will have to apply for a permanent license as soon as the temporary license is received. The Board was also presented with technical information of the various components of the system including antenna, computer to manage system and customer end use equipment. All of this equipment is being provided at no cost from MuralNet.

 - <u>Council took no action on budget proposal and has not taken any action as of today's meeting</u> <u>date.</u> (Council approved the 2020 budget on December 17th; however, results have not been given the departments as of the 19th)
 - Wanda has indicated that final budgets will be issued in the near future.
 - o Council was interested in installing some solar at GCW to reduce ongoing fuel costs. .
 - <u>Council also asked about how difficult it would be to bring a new line directly into Peach</u> <u>Springs.</u>
 - It was explained to council that a new line from Round Valley Substation or Peacock had been looked at and are considered viable options to serving Peach Springs. Both of these options should be considered as the next phase after the Dolan Springs to Grand Canyon West Power line is constructed. The final phase would be to create a loop by connecting the line from Peach Springs to the Dolan Springs line thus providing a level of reliability never achieved before on the entire Hualapai Reservation. This connector line would be built along Buck and Doe Road and be ready to serve any future water pumping Road.
 - <u>Council requested that HTUA organize a presentation from WAPA to discuss</u> power line routing options and how WAPA might play a larger role in establishing new power lines to the Hualapai Reservation.
- Tierra ROW contract Modifications Presentation to Council
 - <u>At its December 7th meeting, the Council approved the increase amount to the Tierra</u> <u>Right Of Way contract and extended the completion time to the end of May 2020.</u>
 - <u>The increase in time and increase in contract amount is to facilitate the completion of</u> <u>additional work due to BLM's request and the recent discovery of two mining claims</u> <u>along the proposed power line right-of-way.</u>
- <u>Educational Network MuraNet</u>
 - o <u>Temporary FCC approval for bandwidth</u>

Kevin, Richard and the General Manager will make the final decision on</u> <u>which area to file the grant under.</u>
 - <u>It is the intent to have the final grant submission packet available for review and approval by</u> <u>the HTUA Board at the January meeting</u>. <u>Grant Submission deadline is February 6, 2020</u>.
 - <u>The Board discussed the possible locations for the solar field at GCW.</u> No decision was made on a recommended site. Aesthetics and costs will be the deciding factors. Costs will be less the closer the array is placed to the existing micro grid; however the solar field will be more visible.
 - <u>The Board made it clear that grant applications should focus on utility-scale solar at GCW</u> and not smaller distributed applications at other areas on the reservation.

 - <u>An extended power outage in excess of 13 hours occurred in Peach Spring over the</u> <u>Thanksgiving weekend.</u>
 - Spoke with Rick Campos regarding the outage on 12/1/2019
 - o <u>Rick indicated</u>
 - it was a widespread outage impacting all four distributions circuits emanating from Nelson Substation
 - Transmission line from Round Valley did not experience an outage
 - <u>The distribution circuit outage was caused by snow and ice accumulations on</u> <u>the power lines and tree branches</u>
 - The length of the outage was due to the vast number of repairs to be made
 - They did not bring in additional crews from neighboring utilities
 - <u>Rick did not indicate this, but I suspect that the circuit serving the Tribe may have</u> <u>been one of the last ones to receive attention</u>
 - <u>HTUA with its own staff could have reduced the duration of the outage as the Tribal</u> load restoration would be prioritized as number 1. This is one of the reasons why the <u>Tribe should be strongly considering taking over MEC's Peach Springs assets.</u>
 - MEC sent out a poorly scripted outage notice for a scheduled outage on Thursday the <u>12th</u>. I have no knowledge that MEC consulted with the Hualapai Tribe to schedule a <u>mutually acceptable time</u>.
 - <u>Recommendations</u>
 - Send Board letter to MEC for a meeting.(To better understand MEC's possible position, Kevin and Bill will initiate a call prior to next meeting and prior to sending formal letter from the Board.)
 - <u>Emphasize Hualapai concern regarding reliability</u>
 - <u>Express concern about lack of communications about follow-up</u> outage that occurred on the 12th.
 - Ask them to provide written reply that will outline steps they will take to minimize future outages



- Ask them if they would be interested in:
 - <u>Possibility of MEC divestiture of Electrical assets serving Peach</u> Springs that serves Hualapai, how much?
 - <u>Determine if they would consider allowing HTUA to wheel</u> <u>power over their transmission line</u>
